TAC By-law Amendments

Proposed TAC By-law Amendments to Permit Virtual Meetings

Deletions to the existing by-law wording shown as strike-through text. Additions to the existing wording shown as underlined text.

4.06 Participation in Meetings

Participation at meetings shall be in person <u>or by electronic means</u>. Participation by electronic means is prohibited. Voting <u>at in-person meetings</u> is <u>will be</u> by <u>a</u> show of hands, <u>unless a motion is made for a ballot vote</u>. <u>Voting at</u> <u>electronic meetings will be at the discretion of the chair</u>. Participation in voting by proxy is prohibited.

4.07 Annual General Meeting

An annual general meeting open to all members of the Corporation shall be held in Canada each year on a date and at a location <u>and by a format</u> to be selected by the board of directors. <u>Meetings must allow attendance and voting</u> <u>in a manner that permits their subsequent verification.</u>





ITA, Nordic Forum, Americas Forum

TAC has helped lead a move to reform ITA governance. This resulted in the formation of a Governance Council tasked with conducting an organizational review of the ITA and reports to the Member Nations (via the General Assembly).

- TAC has also pushed for changes in how WTC events are organized and host cities selected. The fiasco arising from the cancellation of the WTC 2020 in Kuala Lumpur have since forced actions to be taken, with recommendations from the ITA to be discussed with Member Nations in early 2021.
- The ITA continues to remain active with key initiatives like the Working Groups. TAC members are invited to get involved and should contact us if they are interested in being a TAC representative for a particular ITA Working Groups .



Engineering Institute of Canada

In April 2020, TAC was accepted as a new member society of the Engineering Institute of Canada (EIC). The EIC is a federation of 14 technical/engineering societies, including the Canadian Geotechnical Society, Canadian Society for Civil Engineering, Canadian Society for Mechanical Engineering and Canadian Dam Association.

- TAC is now eligible to nominate members for EIC awards and honours, such as Fellows of the EIC and the Julian C. Smith Medal and K.Y. Lo Medal recognizing significant engineering contributions to Canada and internationally, respectively.
- The EIC also participates in the Bacon and Eggheads breakfast talk series, which focusses on connecting Parliamentarians with experts in science and engineering.

Current 2020 Membership

As of November 2, 2020, total TAC membership was 404 individuals and firms broken down as follows (with a comparison to the figures at last year's AGM):

In 2019, total membership was 474 – our current count of 404 represents a 15% year over year decrease. We surmise that the downturn is primarily due to COVID-19 effects, particularly the student membership numbers.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors of the Tunnelling Association of Canada / Association Canadienne Des Tunnels

Report on the Financial Statements

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Tunnelling Association of Canada / Association Canadienne Des Tunnels, which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2019, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year ended December 31, 2019, and notes, comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Quebec – Current Projects

• **REM**: The \$6.3B REM light rail train project will be the fourth largest automated transportation system in the world after Singapore, Dubai and Vancouver. It comprises the rehabilitation of the existing 100-year-old Mont Royal Tunnel to house two underground stations at McGill University and the University of Montreal. One of the stations will be the second deepest station in the world at approximately 70 m. Excavation work is nearing completion for the two stations – installation of inside structures will follow. The project includes an additional two underground stations and an approximately 3 km long tunnel to run under the Montreal International Airport runways. The launch of the EPB 6.5 m diameter tunnel occurred in October.

• Garage Cote-Vertu: Excavation work and the majority of concrete work is already completed for this approximately 2.5 km long underground storage and maintenance facility that will house 10 new trains and connect to the existing tail track at the Cote Vertu Station.

• Romaine-4, Quebec: The final 245 MW site to be constructed as part of the total 1550 MW project on the river. Work continues on the diversion tunnel awarded to EBC.



Quebec – Current Projects

• Atwater Conveyance Tunnel: Provisional acceptance of the project was approved over the summer and tunnel work is now underway that involves a new raw water intake tunnel, two deep shafts and an approximately 2 km long conveyance tunnel. Firms include CRT and Hammel constructors of Quebec, and Hatch as the designer and construction manager.

• **Bassin Lavigne**: This 2.1 km long, 2.4 m inside diameter tunnel constructed by drill and blast with carrier pipe installation has recently been completed. Contractor: EBC. Designer & Construction Manager: City of Montreal & Hatch.

• Lafontaine Tunnel Rehabilitation Project: This \$1.2B project was recently awarded to a joint venture of Vinci, Eurovia & Pomerleau. Construction to start spring 2021.



Quebec – Pending and Possible Future Projects

• Montreal's Metro Blue Line: The eastern Blue Line extension will add five new stations to reach Anjou, and a retention pool at Lavigne to manage storm water (3 tunnels of 2 m diameter with total length of 2.1 km). Expected contract packaging in early 2021.

• Quebec Tramway: Approximately 2.5 km of tunnels and 4 underground stations. Qualifications of 3 teams occurred in the summer 2020. The RFQ is expected at the end of 2020 pending additional environmental and ridership studies.

• **Collecteur Industriel**: Wastewater tunnel east of Montreal. Expected tender for final design anticipated at the end of 2020.

• Third Link between Québec and Levis: Feasibility studies ongoing.



Ontario

The strong tunnelling market in Ontario continues to keep local contractors busy and attract more international competition from the US and around the world.

Currently there are numerous tunnelling projects nearing construction completion, several new projects that have just started to break ground, and a good number of upcoming projects that are in the design phase. A summary of the most representative current, near term and future projects in Ontario includes:

– Current Projects

- Hwy # 401 Rail Tunnel Project, Toronto: Anticipated completion: 2021
- Eglinton Crosstown (Stations Contract): Anticipated completion: 2021
- Coxwell Bypass: Anticipated completion: 2024



Ontario – Current Projects

- Ashbridges Bay Outfall: Anticipated completion: 2024
- East to West Diversion Sanitary Trunk Sewer: Anticipated completion: 2022
- Toronto Island Watermain Revitalization: Anticipated completion: 2021

Microtunnelling Projects

Along with tunnelling, microtunnelling continues to contribute to the active underground work in Ontario. Many projects are being constructed all over the province, such as the **York Durham Sewage System (YDSS) Forcemain Twinning Project** in the Town of Newmarket, estimated to be completed by the end of 2021



Ontario – Near-term Projects

• East Brampton Watermain Contract 2, Peel Region: 4.5km of twinned watermain. Anticipated tender 2020

• Scarborough Subway Extension, Toronto: 7km of single bore tunnel 11m internal diameter and 3 stations including terminus station. The project went to tender as DBF, with the expected award in January 2021.

• Eglinton Crosstown West Extension: ECWE Phase 1 consists of 7km of tunnel and 3km of at grade and elevated guideway. Includes 7 stations – 4 underground, 2 elevated and 1 at grade. Advance tunnels went to tender as DBF, expected award in Jan 2021.

• Fairbanks Silverthorn Storm Trunk Sewer System, Toronto: 2.5km of 3m to 4m diameter storm sewer tunnels and approximately 12km of new local storm sewers ranging from 250mm to 1800mm diameter. Anticipated Tender: 2021

• Upper York Sewage Servicing (UYSS), Newmarket: 5km of a combination of conventional tunnelling and micro tunnelling with internal diameters ranging from 1.8m to 3m. Anticipated Tender: 2021



Ontario – Future Projects

• Ontario Line, Toronto: A 15.5km long tunneled, aerial and at grade alignment to relieve crowding on the existing Line 1 subway.

- Conceptual Design complete.
- RSSOM (systems & vehicles) DBFOM RFQ out now
- Southern Civil, Stations & Tunnel (DBF) RFQ out now
- Northern Civil, Stations & Tunnel (DBF) RFQ 2021

• Yonge Subway Extension, Toronto/Richmond Hill: A 7.4 km tunnel, 6-station extension of the existing Yonge Subway, potentially utilizing a very large TBM. Twin @ 6.1 m OD or Single Bore @ 17.3 m OD TBD

- Conceptual Design complete.
- RFQ 2022

• Eglinton West Extension Airport Segment: Metrolinx and Infrastructure Ontario are planning the construction of an approximately 4.5 km long second extension of the under-construction Eglinton Crosstown Light Rail Transit (ECLRT), from Renforth/Commerce Station to the Pearson Airport Terminus Station at Viscount Road

Ontario – Future Projects

• Inner Harbour West, Toronto: Part 3 of the Don River and Central Waterfront Projects initiated by the City of Toronto, (the other parts being the Coxwell Bypass and Massey Creek), consists of a 5.6km tunnel.

- Design awarded summer 2020.
- DBB Construction estimated 2023.

• **Taylor-Massey Creek Tunnel, Toronto**: Part 2 of the Don River and Central Waterfront Projects connects to the Coxwell Bypass. Six km of 4.4m diameter soft ground tunnelling at depths ranging from 12m to 60m below grade.

• RFQ is anticipated in 2021 and construction in 2024.

• West Vaughan Sewage System Project, York Region: Approximately 14km of 3m inside diameter sewer tunnel.

Ontario Chapter News

Activities of the Ontario Chapter of the Tunnelling Association of Canada have been limited since March to online presentations given the COVID-19 pandemic.

The annual year-end social has not yet been cancelled – Chapter Executive members are looking at alternative virtual options should COVID-19 pandemic event attendance restrictions continue into December.

Ontario Chapter members are involved in the final edits of the TAC Coffee Table Book as well as Local Organizing Committee planning for the rescheduled TAC 2020-One Conference that will be hosted in Toronto in October 2021.



Prairies (Saskatchewan and Manitoba) Current Projects

2020 continued with several tunnelling projects planned for the City of Winnipeg as part of two overlapping City programs, the **Basement Flood Relief program (BFR)**, and the **Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO) Management Program**.

Four major projects are underway as part of the BFR & CSO programs. Together, these projects have over 14 km of pipe installations in excess of 1,200 mm, and include pipe diameters up to 3,000 mm.

For 2020:

Contract 5 on **Cockburn Sewer Relief** (700 m of 2100/2400 mm pipe using 2 pass method) **Jefferson Sewer Relief** 2100 mm trunk sewer – ongoing using 2 pass method



Near Term to Future Projects

Near-term City of Winnipeg:

- Contract 6A on Cockburn Sewer Relief – 2100 mm trunk sewer
- Contract 6B on Cockburn Sewer
 Relief 1600 mm trunk sewer



Future Work

Green Line LRT

Calgary has approved the \$4.5B Green Line LRT, which includes over 3 km of tunnel in the City's downtown area.





British Columbia

The British Columbia tunnel market continues to be very busy with many of the large projects under construction and more in design/procurement.

The local chapter has not met in person since March 2020. A "Meet a Tunneller" presentation at UBC is planned for November. Stay tuned for interactive virtual events for early 2021.

In Construction

North Shore Conveyance

This DB Metro Vancouver project connects the existing Lions Gate Wastewater Treatment plant with the new Treatment plant and ties into the existing outfall below the Lions Gate Bridge. Tunnelling operations began in 2019 and is ongoing with 4 of 8 tunnel runs now complete.

Second Narrows Water Supply Tunnel

The DBB project includes two deep shafts and 6 m diameter tunnel under the Burrard Inlet. The tunnel will house 3 welded steel water mains. North slurry wall shaft excavation is complete. South shaft excavation in sandstone is underway with 80 m out of 110m complete. Tunnelling with a slurry TBM has started with 70 m complete of the 1100 m long drive.



BC – In Construction

Annacis Island Wastewater Treatment Plant Outfall

Construction is underway with excavation and initial lining in both shafts complete. Tunnelling will start in early 2021. The DBB project includes a challenging marine operation to complete the tunnel drive under the Fraser River and install a riser structure and diffuser for the outfall. The construction of the in-river cofferdam is underway.

Broadway Subway Project - Millennium Line Extension

\$1.7B DBF contract to construct 6 km twin bore tunnels in downtown Vancouver as well as six underground stations. The tunnels will house an extension to the existing Millennium Line Skytrain. Project was recently awarded to Acciona-Ghella with start of construction in early 2021, running through 2025.







BC – Future Projects

Eagle Mountain Gas Pipeline

Project consists of a 9 km long, 4 m diameter tunnel to house the 24" pipe as part of the 47 km gas pipeline extension from Coquitlam to the new Woodfibre LNG facility on Howe Sound. The tunnel alignment crosses both hard rock and recent sand deposits. Design Build contract RFP release data is scheduled for late 2020, with start of construction mid 2021.

The Annacis Water Supply Tunnel Another major Metro Vancouver marine crossing to provide reliable drinking water to the region. The DBB project consists of a 2.3 km long 4.5m OD tunnel located between New Westminster and Surrey. Contractor qualifications received this fall. RFP planned for late 2020 and construction planned for Q2 2021-2027.

Stanley Park Water Supply Tunnel

The project consists of a 1.4 km long bedrock tunnel that will house a 2.6 m diameter water main. The project involves the excavation of 3 shafts and 2 tunnel drives through weak sedimentary bedrock as well as construction of two new valve chambers. The Project team is completing Detailed Design. RFP planned for early 2021 with construction late 2021 through 2026.







BC – Future Projects

Coquitlam Intake No. 2

This Project includes 3 km soft ground TBM tunnel and 6 km hard rock tunnel as well as an intake shaft and 3 lake taps. The project is currently at a conceptual level of design. RFP for future design phases are anticipated for 2021/2022.

Coquitlam Main No. 4

The scope of work includes 2 km long tunnel to install two 3 m water pipes to support future expansion of Coquitlam water supply network. Design teams have been shortlisted and RFP for design phase slated for 2021.

Cambie-Richmond Water Supply Tunnel

This Metro Vancouver project is currently in conceptual design phase. The marine crossing between Vancouver and Richmond comprises a tunnel and deep shafts for conveyance of clean water. Start of construction is planned for 2027.

George Massey Tunnel Replacement

Project is in conceptual phase but will likely include a large diameter immersed tube tunnels between Richmond and Delta.
